My name is Gretchen Stork and I live in Clallam County, Washington. I am commenting on behalf of the Vancouver Audubon Society. The EIS must cover the impact of the burning of this coal on global warming. If the coal is not exported, if it is not sold, it will remain in the ground - which it ~~is~~ should be kept. you need to consider the cumulative impact of adding the CO₂ contained in the Millennium coal to the CO₂ load in the atmosphere. If global warming is not halted, nothing else will matter. If the EIS does not include considering the impact of global warming, the whole exercise is pointless. In addition, the EIS should also consider the impacts of mining coal on the ranchers in Montana and Wyoming, the impacts of transporting coal on the communities through which it

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is transported, and the impact of the pollution being blown back across the Pacific. The impact on wildlife, from pronghorns in Wyoming to Salmon in Washington should also be analyzed. It is justified for the EIS to address these things because the ports in the northwest are a link in a chain of the destructive business of coal extraction. The EIS should also look into the economics of the project, considering that China is under pressure from its citizens, appears to be planning to reduce its consumption of coal.

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
